The Pascal Season is upon us

Come explore the drama!

Paschal is an old word for Easter from Passion, which denotes the entire suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus the Christ. It is a time for us Christians to confront our own desire for cheap grace and to remember that we have been saved for a purpose, and that fulfilling that purpose may be difficult and uncomfortable, just as fulfilling all things for our salvation was for Jesus. We are called in Lent to various private and public practices that can aid us in this confrontation and this call to fulfill God's purpose for our lives. I invite you to explore the call of those difficult and uncomfortable things on your life through the Lent and Easter worship offerings at Advent.

SUNDAYS: *On Sundays in Lent we will hear about the Old Testament*

Looking to refocus our funds

We've completed the construction phase of our mission plan at Advent. Now we can focus on God's mission and ministry for our new space. We've begun to plan for new ministries and we will need funding for them. We can achieve that by paying down the mortgage.

Our current mortgage is \$150,000. For every \$10,000 that amount is reduced, we save \$780 per month and \$5600 in interest payments over the life of the loan. If the mortgage payment is reduced or eliminated, we could use those re-

sources for all types of ministry.

Our new space has many possibilities for community service, including events for young adults, activities for teens, and fun events for the community. We could also consider mission activities beyond our walls.

- * Treasurer Ellie Holsopple reported that receipts exceeded disbursements by almost \$1,582 in January. covenants God made with people through the ages, the covenant with Noah and the earth not to destroy it, the covenant of grace with Abraham and Sarah to bless all people, the covenant of the Ten Commandments to protect humans from their own frailties, the covenant promise to provide healing when our sin brings suffering by lifting up a sign on a pole, and the prophetic promise of a new covenant of forgiveness.

We will also hear in the Gospel readings Jesus' explanations of his death and of its meaning for us.

THURSDAYS: *Soup served at 7 pm thanks to those who have offered to share each week, followed by sung candlelight Evening Prayer at 7:30 with a brief meditation of different aspects of Lent. You are invited to come and support each other as our faith community walks the way of Christ.*

PALM SUNDAY: *April 1 worship begins with the blessing of the palms for all the gathered pilgrims and a joyous procession welcoming Jesus into our midst. There will be special music to start us! But just as the mood changed quickly in Jerusalem, so to in our worship we shift quickly to **PASSION SUNDAY.***

We will hear the story in Mark's gospel of Jesus' arrest, trial, and death, and how none of his disciples ever figured out who he really was, how his identity remained hidden to those who should have been the first to know.

HOLY MAUNDY THURSDAY and **GOOD FRIDAY** at 7:30 pm we will have the opportunity to go with Jesus in his last hours. We will hear John's account of the Last Supper (very different from Mark's) and John's account of the arrest and crucifixion as seen from God's viewpoint, where Jesus is very much in charge

EASTER SUNDAY we will celebrate at 10 am in solidarity with all those disciples through the centuries and around the world who still look for the meaning of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection for them. We will hear again the human viewpoint as recorded in Mark's gospel of the disciples' reaction and how the meaning of his death remained hidden even when the disciples are confronted with the empty tomb.

God's viewpoint vs. human viewpoint: you are invited to witness the whole drama by participating in it this Paschal season.

Changes abound at Gettysburg

New pastors come from seminaries and "our" seminary is Gettysburg Lutheran Theological Seminary. Advent was delighted to host senior seminarian Matthew Day on February 26, who preached the sermon and shared something about the life of seminarians. He and his seminarian fiancée are assigned to the Delaware Maryland Synod for call to congregations there. During the forum Seminarian Day told us about his studies, courses and professors. He also told us about plans for the future at the seminary that involve the historical value of the seminary. It was used as a stop on the underground railroad and as a field hospital during the Battle of Gettysburg. That building is being renovated by the National Park Service as a museum of religious and civil war history and will become a major tourism center beginning in July 2013, the 150th anniversary of the Battle. The seminary expects 80,000 tourists a year. Next door to the Old Seminary building is the Chapel, so, with the expectation of visits by Veterans, the Seminary is renovating it to be fully accessible and is soliciting donations to aid that project. Envelopes are available in the lobby for those who would like to contribute to this or to any other work of the seminary. SPRING HAS SPRUNG

Make this craft to capture the beauty of God's creation in springtime.

What you need:

- White glue that dries clear
- White watercolor paper
- Black fine-point permanent marker
- Watercolors
- Paint brush
- Water bowl
- Paper towels



What you do:

1. With glue, draw a picture on watercolor paper of flowers and other things in God's creation we see in spring. Keep lines fairly big and simple, without many small details.
2. After the glue dries, use a fine-point permanent marker to trace the glue lines.
3. Paint your picture with watercolors for a stained-glass effect.

Isaiah 35 describes the rebirth of a dry land when Jesus returns, as well as the signs of God's beautiful creation at springtime.



Resurrection COUNTDOWN

Make this interactive craft to use as Easter approaches.

What you need:

- An empty egg carton
- Scissors
- Tissue paper (a dark color)
- Pencil
- Bible
- 12 slips of white paper
- Glue
- Marker



What you do:

1. Cut the lid and side flaps off the egg carton.
2. Lay the carton open-side down on tissue paper. Trace and cut out the rectangular shape.
3. On the paper slips, write 12 verses from John 12 about Holy Week (including one about Easter).
4. Place each slip in an egg cup, in order, starting at the top left and ending (with the Easter verse) at the bottom right.
5. Put glue around cups and carton edges. Lay the tissue paper on top.
6. Gently mark numbers 1-6 on the tissue paper along the top row and 7-12 along the bottom.
7. Before Easter, punch through one cup each day and read the verse.




Contemplative Communion Service

Each Sunday night during Lent you are invited to Contemplative Communion Services sponsored by the Shalem Institute for Spiritual Formation and the Metropolitan Memorial United Methodist Church (3401 Nebraska Avenue NW, Washington, DC 20016). This is an ecumenical service—all are welcome! Worship will draw on the experiences of “The Mass that Takes Its Time,” an innovative Roman Catholic liturgy; Shalem Institute’s contemplative Eucharist, often celebrated in retreat experiences; and the Methodist *Service of Word and Table*. This liturgy will encourage prayer and reflection within a support spiritual community and nurture awareness of the living Spirit among and within us. Scriptural texts will illuminate the theme of forgiveness as a gift of God. This service is for all who seek a deeper encounter with Divine Presence and a Lenten experience of renewal and healing. Services are in the Great Hall from 7:00-8:30 pm weekly through April 1st, and will be led by Carole Crumley, an Episcopal priest and Senior Program Director for the Shalem Institute, and Drema McAllister-Wilson, a Methodist pastor and Minister for Congregational Care at Metropolitan Memorial United Methodist Church. Advent’s Director of Music Michael Lewallen is serving as cantor.
